Dates of Interest

- 1892: first female math student admitted at the University of Athens (established in 1837)
 - (till 1930 the number increased to 13).
- 1982: first female Full Professor in Mathematics (University of Crete)

 1952: universal right for women to vote and to be elected

Things have changed since then.

- **1975**: principle of gender equality (constitution)
- 2020: first ever female President of Greece (Katerina Sakellaropoulou)
- On the average 50% of the entering and graduating class of the math department at the University of Thessaloniki today are female.

However

- only 1/3 of the people finishing at the top 1% are women.
- 37.5% of Ph.D. students are female
- only 15.3% of all math faculty are women (compare to 20.8% european average).

Something New is Taking Place
